


What is myLibrary?


myLibrary is an Online Library catalogue that allows patrons to access Information Sources that are in their Resource Centre (Library) as well as available online Databases.


Examples of Online Databases are: Proquest eJournals, Proquest ebook Central, DOAJ, DOAB etc.










What is referencing?

- referencing or citation) and linking your citations to your list of works cited (also known as reference list)
- In a source of information (such as a book or passage) to which a reader or consulter is referred (Merriam- Webster, 2022).
- What must be referenced? Quotes, Facts, Figures, diagrams, images or any other visual material, ideas and theories, statistics/studies, interpretations, paraphrases



It is acknowledging your source(s) in the body of your work (in-text)






Reference Style

- Eduvos mostly use two Referencing Styles : Harvard Referencing Style APA Referencing Style – Psychology students only
- What is Harvard Style?
- Harvard Style is an author-date system of referencing. It uses in-text citations in the body of the text (assignment) and a REFERENCE LIST on a separate page at the end of the assignment.
- Citations and Reference List goes together like bread and butter – you cannot have a citation without a reference.







used to acknowledge the work or ideas of others. They are placed next to the text that you have paraphrased or quoted, enabling the reader to differentiate between your writing and other

When presenting ideas or information from a source, include the authors' surname/s and date of publication in brackets within the text of your writing, e.g. These skills need to be developed over time (Smith, Williams and Snicker, 2010).

Where you refer to the authors' name in the body of the text, include the date of publication in brackets, e.g., Smith et al. (2010) suggest increased penalties and driver education as two









Referencing Elements

- Referencing elements consist of elements such as: the name of the author(s), publication details consisting of the year of publication, city of publication and publisher, the title of an information material which can be a book, journal article or web page and page number.
- The author is usually written surname first, followed by the first and middle name, titles are excluded e.g. Dr, Mrs., Professor, etc.



What is a Reference List?



Your reference list should be located on a separate page at the end of your assignment and titled references/reference list. It should include the full details of all your in - text references (arranged alphabetically A-Z by authors surnames and not numbered).

The terms 'Bibliography' and 'Reference List' are often used interchangeably, however a reference list only includes items you have referenced in your assignment whereas, a bibliography also includes items used to prepare your assignment.
